Post member Chuck Herschlag was amongst the honored veterans for the latest Mission flight to Washington D.C. The following is an article about that trip and the experiences shared . was written by Chuck's Granddaughter (and Trip Guardian) **Courtney Hourihan**.

On Flag Day, I was honored to accompany my grandfather, Charles Herschlag, on Mission #17 with the Buffalo Niagara Honor Flight. What used to be a jampacked, less than 24-hour event has

now turned into a (still jampacked) 2-day event to D.C. to visit many of the memorials for our fallen heroes. My goal in going with Grandpa was two-fold – to spend more time with him learning of his memories, but also to show him just how much of a hero he is, and not just to me!

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We started our trip meeting as a group in the local UAW parking lot on Wehrle Drive. Forty veterans, their guardians, medical staff, dedicated media personnel, and a small BNHF delegation were escorted by local law enforcement officers and Patriot Guard, with their flags billowing in the wind to the Buffalo Niagara International Airport to depart for Baltimore. At the airport, we were greeted by the Amherst Police honor guard, and more volunteers with well wishes and support to send us off with the sounds of patriotic music after a heartful salute to the Star-Spangled Banner.

An uneventful and short flight later, there was much excitement, jubilation, and exuberant hand waving as we

disembarked to a warm welcome by the Town Crier, fellow travelers, and Baltimore Honor Flight Volunteers. The Town Crier escorted our group out of the airport ringing his bell, and announcing to all that honored veterans were in their presence. We split in half to our designated bus to claim our seats for our trip and meet our Honor Flight Tour guides, Andy, and Mark. Andy was our guide, and she is a WNY native from Strykersville, NY!





Our first stop was at Ft. McHenry, where Francis Scott Key wrote his be-FORT MCHENRY NATIONAL MONUMENT AND loved poem, on our way out of Maryland. We were treated to a short movie of no more than 10 minutes on the history of the fort, the flag, Francis Scott Key, and the impact of the Battle of Baltimore in September 1814. As the movie ends, the screen lifts and all you see out the window is the large flag that now flies over Ft. McHenry. A room filled with other tourists all rose as our veterans all got up from their chairs to salute that flag as the Star-Spangled Banner played once again. It was a moving moment, that words cannot convey, even as I feel the goosebumps rise on my arm writing this. Seeing small children stand to mimic our veterans and honor the flag was breathtaking! After the movie, the vets gathered around the Fort tour guide,

Jerry, as he spouted additional cool facts about the history of our flag. Under Jerry's guidance, the veterans and half of the guardians unfolded a replica of the original flag standing guard of the Fort in 1814 that was made of wool with dimensions of 30 feet by 42 feet with 15 stars and 15 stripes. Jerry made sure to end his educational speech with the reminder, "The last two words to the National Anthem are not "play ball!"

We were given the chance as a group to go to the battlement parade grounds where there is a current 30'x42' flag flying. Our own Lamm Post and Korean Conflict veteran, Chuck Herschlag, was honored as the first from our tour group to raise a flag on the side arm of the Fort's main staff. For those that have not seen a 30'x42' flag up close, seeing a 'normal' size flag one would raise at home (approx. 3'x5') sure can make one feel so small!

From Ft. McHenry we went to claim our hotel rooms for the night, but we were not in our rooms long. We were off to dinner in the hotel's catering hall where more storytelling and reminiscing happened with fellow veterans and friends/family. Upon completion of the meal, we had Mail Call. So many letters from home made it to our veterans in surprise, but the biggest surprise for Grandpa that night was being presented with the flag he raised at Ft. McHenry!





After dinner, we were off for night tours at the National Mall. As most of our group were Vietnam vets, this was the first stop. Grandpa and I were curious enough to stick around to see the group photo taken and make our way to the wall for a walk-by then a stop at the Vietnam Women's Memorial where a huge pile of hair ties was left by a group of nursing students visiting.

We then made our way to the Korean War Memorial, which in the dusk with the lighting, was breathtaking! This is where Grandpa and I walked most of that evening, talking about nothing and everything. But, to his honor, Grandpa still does not speak about what he did in the service as he was ASA or Army Security Agency. He still keeps those secrets top secret! Upon completion of our reflection, we made our way back to the bus at a slow pace, as Grandpa was shaking hands with a multitude of teenagers thanking him for his service. (Insert sobs here as it was so moving to see 3 boys of 14 or 15 break away from the group to be the first to approach Grandpa. Of course, no one wanted to be left out and that 3 turned into almost 50 before we got to the bus!) With rain curtailing our plans to see the memorial

at the Pentagon, we returned to the hotel to rejuvenate for Day 2 – early wakeup as breakfast is at 6:45 am!

While I was learning new things about Grandpa, he definitely learned something about me... I am NOT a morning person! He woke nice and early, me... The only reason I didn't need an alarm was because he was there with me, yet quiet as a mouse he still scared me when I opened my eyes! (No worries, no harm done. I promised both my mom and uncle I would bring him back safe, in one piece \Box I should also mention that I am pretty sure Grandpa learned that I am not to be the one in charge of his wheelchair should he ever need one... but again, no worries! He stayed upright both times!) Washed, dressed, packed, and ready to go we start the day out on the bus by 7:45 am where we depart for Arlington National Cemetery.



Our trip to Arlington included time with our distinguished guest for the day, U.S. Navy Commander Stevie Greenway. Our destination, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier for the changing of the guard as well as the placement of a wreath. Before the ceremony, there was time to take group shots and honor those buried nearby, including the most decorated veteran, Lieutenant Audie Murphy.

Promptly at 9 am, the changing of the guard ceremony starts. Silence was all around; the only sound heard was the guards' heels and the person breathing next to you. The wreath

was advanced by a set of 4 brothers on our trip, the Chester brothers, for placement. After our time at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, we headed to our busses, where the Sgt of the Guard came aboard to personally thank the veterans for their service, as he, too, has a connection to WNY as a native of Belfast, NY. We learned he



would be home in two weeks for his wedding - not sure who invited who, but he told our veterans free beer for anyone that showed up. I wonder if any of our more southern friends got there?

We continued our tour by heading to The United States Marine Corps Memorial. The giant depiction of the iconic



flag raising on Iwo Jima during WWII sits atop a pedestal etched with every battle the Marines have participated in.

We then headed to the Air Force Memorial on the opposite side of the 640-acre cemetery. Grandpa got off the bus here specifically to get a picture to send to his grandson, an Air Force veteran. The three spires shoot skyward from the ground in a replication of the twisting bomb burst maneuver that the Thunderbirds aerial demonstration team performs.

The memorial is designed to replicate a landing strip complete with taxiways. A larger-than-life Honor Guard stands on constant vigil. (Continued on page 4)

Returning to the National Mall, we traveled to the World War II Memorial. We were welcomed by another enthusiastic group of Honor flight Volunteers and General Patton (or at least a reasonable likeness thereof.) Tourists at the memorial joined in welcoming and shaking hands, thanking the veterans as they went by. Grandpa told me he had been to this memorial before, at its dedication in May 2004 when he was NY Department Commander. He did ask to have his picture taken by the NY pillar this trip but also made sure to make it over to his home state's pillar, Nebraska before we made our way back to the bus.



Our last stop before trekking back to Baltimore to fly home was to the

US Navy Museum. A statue of the Lone Sailor overlooks a relief map of the world while a fountain churns with water collected from all the world's oceans.

Another short, uneventful flight and we were home at the Buffalo Niagara International Airport. We were greeted at the gate and escorted through to the arrivals door by the Amherst Police Honor Guard as well as the Buffalo Pipe and Drum Corps. This walk was probably the most emotional part for me as Grandpa stated, 'Maybe I did do something important for the war effort.' Yes, Grandpa, you so very much did. Without your service in D.C., you never would have met the love of your life, Mary Lou, and I would not be me. I am so proud of who I am and what I do because of what you taught me and helped raise me. Thank you, Grandpa, for allowing me the honor of being your guardian for this trip!
